What We Do - BRTB

- Two-year work program (UPWP)
- Short-term transportation program (TIP)
- Long-range transportation plan (*Maximize2040*)
- Air quality assessments of all transportation projects







What is the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

- Short-range (four-year) program of transportation improvements & priority projects
- Financially constrained
- Authorizes project sponsor to seek or use federal funds
- Generally updated annually
 - Current TIP is FY 2016-2019
- Amendments require 30-day public review

New projects, new funding, etc.



Air Quality Assessment

 The TIP goes through a process that compares estimated pollutants (emissions) from transportation projects to limits (budgets) set by the state.



This report, called a "conformity determination", addresses fine particulate matter (PM2.5), 8-hour ozone and CO standards.

I-95 from Moravia Road to the Fort McHenry Tunnel (FT-3003)







I-95 Improvements

Reconfigure I-95 to provide four continuous lanes in each direction between the Fort McHenry Tunnel and the I-95 ETLs.



All improvement will be made within the existing highway typical section.



RESTRIPING ALTERNATIVE

Baltimore Metropolitan Council

- 11.5-foot travel lanes
- 2-foot 10-inch inside offsets
- 10-foot outside shoulders

- Design-Bid-Build Project
- This is the second and final phase of the project (Phase 1 built in 2012).
- MDTA is paying for 100% of the project.
